

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What is Take Our Kids to Work Day?

Launched in 1994, Take Our Kids to Work Day is the most recognized career exploration event in Canada. Developed by The Learning Partnership, the annual event occurs in November each year. It is an opportunity for students to explore career options and navigate their interests in a fun and engaging way.

On Wednesday, November 6th, 2019, Grade 9, Senior 1 (Manitoba), and Secondary III (Quebec) students across Canada will spend the day at the workplace of a parent, relative, friend or volunteer host.

How do I ensure my child's safety

It is essential that both students and parents receive information about health and safety prior to their workplace visit. Parents need to be aware of the work that their children are engaging in on this day and ask questions about the health and safety provisions.

Consult with your organization's health and safety committee to advise in preparation for November 6th. Information on workplace health and safety can be accessed on The Learning Partnership's website.

Where can students go for the day?

Parents/guardians are encouraged to invite their children to join them at work, but if this is not possible here are other ways for your child to participate:

- Ask a relative, neighbour or family friend to take your child to work.
- Ask another parent, who is taking their child to work, if your child can join them for the day.
